"Visionaries" is one of the many words that might be used to describe our co-directors. Their UU group focus involvement began in Needham when they organized and ran a 6-week cooperative vacation for their fellow church members. In Atlanta they helped design the extended family program, one of the 1st in the country. Then on to SUUSI where they taught workshops and ultimately became its lirectors for 2 years. Evolving with their committment was a strong(should we say intense) desire to establish a place, a camp, a center belonging to UUs, where we could gather year-round for learning, caring, solitude and celebration. The camp and conference center feasibility committee emerged in 1977, logically chaired by Mo and Larry.

Mo and Larry's summer activities over the years led each to recognize they wanted to be part of a UU camp/conference center on a full time basis.

The Director's position calls for one personbut the energy Mo and Larry are putting in at this time more than exceeds that of I person. Mo and Larry applied jointly for the job, to be called co-directors, because it was to be a year round position where their many talents and experiences could be utilized; it meant they could truly make the life style change they sought; and because they like working together.

Recently Mo completed a long sought PhD in counseling psychology. While sharing director uties with Larry, she is able to pursue consulting, presently in Atlanta-perhaps later in North Carolina.

Larry, a MBA in marketing, was employed as a district sales manager with General Foods, Maxwell House division. After 13 successful

years at GF, he decided to accept the camp/ conference center challenge fulltime.

If you haven't met Mo, Larry or Brian in person, stop by and do so. Any doubts you may have had about this venture will be quickly dispelled when you learn first hand how this dream became reality.

CAMP FUND RAISERS ALIVE AND WELL...

Active fund drives are underway(or completed) in 10-12 UU societies in the Southeast. The results are most encouraging. As of this writing, total pledges equal \$150,000.00, with a number of important additional pledges promised. The first "draw" on our loan from the Veatch* Program, in the amount of \$35,000 has been requested.

The canvass organization is now complete. Fund raising coordinators have been recruited for 92 of our 104 societies. (Did you know we had that many in the tri-district area?) Most of the coordinators have been trained. Current plans call for the major push to occurr in March and April for most of our societies.

*Veatch Program is a funding source available through the North Shore Unitarian Society, Plandome, Long Island, NY. Approval for loan requests are voted on by the congregation. Their loan to the C&CC of \$200,000 is one of the largest ever granted.


WHAT: Here's just some of the things we'll be doing...

COUPLE ENRICHMENT WEEKEND PLANNED

Faith and Roger Comstock will lead a Couple Enrichment Program(CEP) weekend at the Camp & Conference Center May 16-18. This program, under UUA sponsorship, provides couples with an opportunity to explore together the joys, needs and expectations each bring to their relationship. It is an occasion to learn more about the ways partners relate and communicate their values and lifestyles, and the societal and personal pressure that impinge on their interactions together. Participants arn techniques designed to help them confront and appreciate differences, explore and express them openly in a positive atmosphere, and work towards finding ways to accept and bridge them in a mutually satisfying manner.

The CEP is a 43 hour experience(Friday evening through Sunday afternoon)involving 15-18 couples. There is an opportunity for limited group interaction to practice communication skills, ask questions and to socialize, but the primary workshop activities are conducted between partners, and their privacy is protected. The of \$130 per couple includes 6 meals each and lodging for 2 nights.

The program is designed for normally functioning couples seeking to build a better relationship. It is not helpful to couples seriously considering the pros and cons of separation. Marriage is not prerequisite for participation, but the couple should be in a on-going committed relationship. Persons in therapy should consult their counselor on the advisabily of participation.

DISCOVERIES...

Exploration of the area surrounding our UU mountain has brought discovery in stages. Christmas Day the Wheelers and Bob Clabeaux of Deland,FL, located a 30' waterfall just off the edge of the property in the National Forest. Then Walt Pirie,Blacksburg, VA and the New Year's group discovered that another waterfall could be seen from the first one.

Recently, the Wheelers, Catherine & Jack Hart, Dundannon, VA, and Glendia Manka, Clayton, GA, followed the streams to where they metat the foot of another 60' drop! It was an incredible sight-especially covered with ice!

FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO JUST JOINED US--Here's a little background...

For many years, SE UUs have had a dream about a recreation place they could call their own. In 1977, the Board of SUUSI decided to do something about it. They financed a feasibility study to determine if people really cared about an active summer program and whether we could afford it. A formal market study indicated UUs definitely would support such a project.

With this input, the SUUSI board, representing all 104 societies in the tri-district area of the SE, purchased an existing camp near Highlands, NC and created a corporation to run it.

The venture has excited national interest among UUs. It is looked upon as one of the best ways to promote a sense of family among UUs in different locations, and it will thus be a major contributor to our national extension goals.

About the camp, itself...it is situated atop a 4200 foot mountain. Formerly Camp Highlander for 14 years, it contains 30 buildings. At the base of the mountain are three small lakes, stables for 24 horses and two tennis courts. On top are 20 cabins, a modern 6-bedroom lodge, a large dining hall and recreation building, a tower, a crafts building and several others.

The camp overlooks 10,000 acres of National forest. Glen Falls, a 75 foot waterfall is within hiking distance. The area boasts of numerous other waterfalls and natural attraction. It is a spectacular site!
