Directors' Corner

The caller was a friend. She said they were trying to decide between THE MOUNTAIN'S youth camp and the YWCA camp. I could feel the adrenalin . . . Now, I have nothing against the YWCA. But, I do feel a lot about THE MOUNTAIN. I asked her to hear me out.

I told her that if she wanted to encourage her daughter to develop an identity as a Unitarian Universalist, if she wanted her to accept the values we hold, if she wanted her to develop a group of UU friends from throughout the Southeast . . . then there was no choice. I told her about this spring's flurry of calls among the teenagers going to Senior High camp. I told her the Senior High Camp had increased by 33% this summer, that the 11-13 year old camp was full, and that if she did want her daughter in the 7-10 year old camp, she needed to make her decision quickly.

At this writing, I'm not sure what she chose. Sometimes finances prevail. Sometimes what your children's friends are doing is a powerful influence. Sometimes parents allow their children to make choices which the parents ought to make.

She may be angry with me for my response. If she were the only one, I would let it go. If she could only see what happens here at camp . . . If she could see a ten year old boy persuading a woman in her late sixties to be part of their evening program as he sat next to her at vespers . . . If she could see 40 teenagers spread out in the Rec building planning their schedules for the week . . . If she could see the counselors worrying about a particular child's getting along with others . . . Would it make a difference? I wonder.

Roger is a management consultant with over 20 years experience in accounting, finance and data processing activities for non-profit corporations. He is married, with 3 children.

Ray Hubbard - a UU for 10 years. Ray first joined the Clemson, SC Fellowship and is now a member of the Atlanta NW Congregation where he has served as a Board member and is currently president-elect for 1983.
