Combine all that with very fine food, new friendships, an exceptional child care program, an energetic, creative staff, a wide variety of outdoor activities from river rafting to waterfall tours and hikes and you have a vacation week at The Mountain. Won't you come join us for a wonderful time? You deserve it!



One of the things I find interesting, if not somewhat frustrating, is how many people do not think of me as a minister or my work as ministry. They think of me as an administrator or as a CEO, all in a tone of voice that makes the word bureaucrat sound akin to the "F" word.

I feel like the widow who went to a spiritualist to see if she could contact her husband. The spiritualist went into a trance and soon a voice was heard.

"Mary," it said, "are you there?" The woman was overjoyed. "Elwood...is it really you? Are you all right?"

"I'm fine, I'm fine."

"Is it nice there, dear?" asked the widow.

Elwood replied, "Beautiful. Absolutely beautiful. Blue sky, pure air, green grass. And the cows, Mary. You've never seen such beautiful cows!"

Perplexed, the woman asked, "Elwood...cows in heaven?"

"Who's talking about heaven?" responded Elwood. "I'm a bull in Texas!"

I suppose there is no way of getting out of the fact that as the executive director of The Mountain, I am an administrator. But I have to tell you that I am proud of that fact. You see, the word administrator literally means "toward ministry." And let's also be reminded that ministry is rooted in the concept of waiting at tables. Yes, ministers are glorified busboys and waitstaff, waiters and waitresses at the tableboard of life. The work of the administrator is to facilitate the ministry and service of people.

The tableboard of Unitarian Universalism is richly and amply laid. Not bound by dogma and creed, we may feast on the bounty of the world's great religions and philosophies. We are nourished by such traditions as Judaism, Christianity, Buddhism, Islam, Hinduism, Humanism, Liberation theology, and Feminism. We are fed by a host of providers who range from Moses to Maslow, from Deborah to Dorothy Dix, from Buddha to Banck and from St. Paul to Linus Pauling.

How we serve such a fare at The Mountain is the administrator's greatest challenge. It is not enough to offer programming on such a rich heritage as Unitarian Universalism. Sometimes I think that is like reading the menu. How do you give people an opportunity to taste and savor the values of our liberal religious heritage? How can the mantle of Unitarian Universalism be broken, cast, and embodied by its people?

The feast is spread throughout the entire operation of The Mountain. Every aspect of the organization is directed toward the service of Unitarian Universalism, or, as we say, "service is our sacrament." Obviously food service, but also marketing, maintenance and fund raising are committed to such a sacrament. It is, afterall, pretty difficult to prepare a meal without cooks or stoves or revenue to provide the larder and pay the fuel bills. Also, someone needs to send the invitation.

So, I think I have a pretty full ministry at The Mountain as an administrator. In addition to all of the above I also offer a Sunday service weekly, either at The Mountain or in congregations throughout the Southeast. I give an optional UU presentation to Elderhostel participants each week. I am also privileged to offer pastoral care to individuals and families. This year I will offer another workshop at G.A., and two at S.U.U.S.I. This past year I have had the privilege to help form the new T.J. District Youth Program Council.

It is a full ministry, and I would like to invite you to the feast.

This is generally a repeat of the vacation week described above, but in five days instead of six. Cost for this program, Sunday dinner through Friday breakfast is \$256 for adult members; \$286 for non-members.

June 25 - June 30 - Creative Leisure Week

Create and recreate in our cool, quiet mountain environment, with Virginia Talbot as your week's coordinator. This week you can choose among a number of craft, drama, music and outdoor activities to find the ones that suit your fancy. Cost for Sunday dinner through Saturday breakfast is \$290 for adult members; \$326 for adult non-members. Some off-mountain activities such as the Cherokee trip and river rafting require an extra fee.

July 2 - July 8 - Spectacular Singles Week

Dick "Froggy" Borung, resident artist and musician, and Tina Tockman, social worker and workshop presenter, will lead this vacation week for singles. Cost for the week, Sunday dinner through Saturday breakfast is \$305 for members, \$329 for non-members. There will be an extra fee for whitewater rafting. This program is designed to ensure that singles can get away from their family responsibilities, but child care will be provided for those who need it during major adult program time.

July 30 - August 5 - Adventure for All Ages #1

August 6 - August 12 - Adventure for All Ages #2

This playful week will give you plenty of opportunity to have fun as a family or separately. Dr. Kit Howell of the Unitarian Church of Fort Lauderdale will be guest minister for the first week, July 30 - August 5. He will lead the group in spiritual growth with evening vespers and special services.

Cost for the week of July 30-August 5, Sunday dinner through Saturday breakfast, is \$305 per adult for members; \$329 per adult for non-members.

"Project First Step" Needs Help Toward Goal of \$20,000

"Money is not coming in as fast as we had hoped, but so far people have contributed a total of \$3630 toward the first step in the new MountainCamp - the building of a new Ascender home," says Brian Wheeler, board member and coordinator of Project First Step.

Brian and a group of youth camp leaders (see above) conducted a mailing at the end of February to former Ascenders and staff and others asking for a donation for the new building. The building is to be constructed near the base of The Mountain, close to the new MountainCamp location as outlined in the 2001 Plan. Most of the labor for the new building would be done on a volunteer basis by youth camp leaders and other interested people.

"This is the first time the young adults at The Mountain have launched a fund raising effort of this magnitude," says Brian. "It's exciting to see the results come in, but it's also a lesson in reality. It is taking longer than we thought."

Andy Harris will direct the Build An Adventure, Beginning Adventure and Greater Adventure camps; Katherine Crum and Peter Benedict will co-direct the Ascender program; Shane Benedict will lead the white water program with Bill Moore as his assistant; Chris Purcel will lead the arts and crafts program with Matt Graves as his assistant; Karen Machler will be the youth camp representative to the kitchen; and Anne Michaelson is coming back for a second year as camp nurse! Other summer counselors and staff members are to be announced.

There are still spaces available for MountainCampers! It's very important, however, that you get your application and payment in right away if you wish to attend one of these spectacular camps. Look for the camp that has the grade you will be entering in the fall.

Beginning Adventurer Camp

for grades two and three.
Sunday, July 30 through Saturday, August 12
Total cost is \$554.

This is the perfect way to introduce your child to a safe, nurturing camp experience. It's appropriate for first or second time campers who are ready to explore the natural world. Children who attend the First Time Out Camp often come back for this two week session.

Campers live in a "family" cabin with two counselors and are encouraged to choose among activities such as rock hounding for precious jewels in the ruby mines of Franklin, visits to Pothole Slides and swimming in the crystal clear waters of Silver Run Falls, "whitewater" rafting on the lake, New Games, adventure and nature hikes, tubing on a gentle river, and visits to the nature center and fishery; crafts including candlemaking, enameling, clay work and woodworking. (All trips are accompanied by trained first aid personnel and any water sports include a lifeguard.)

Each counselor is well prepared to handle the usual occurrences particular to this age group, from bedwetting to homesickness, in a considerate manner that preserves the individual child's self concept. Each child receives as much individual attention as he or she needs.

Greater Adventure Camp

for grades four, five and six.
Sunday, July 16, through Saturday, July 29
Total cost is \$554.

The middle school years are filled with curiosity and energetic exploration. This camp will provide stimulation and adventure at a level designed for individual success. Campers will experience overnight, low-impact camping, canoe and kayak lessons, hiking and a nature acclimation program. Their arts and crafts choices include ceramics, wood working, candle making, weaving, bead work, copper enameling and more.

Discovery Camp

for grades seven, eight and nine
Sunday, July 2, through Saturday, July 15
Total cost is \$577.

Junior high students are developing more and more skills and are becoming more specialized in their choices. They will experience beginning rock climbing on the Mountain, learn group problem solving skills with the Initiatives course, and take part in backpacking overnights. Advanced arts and crafts choices include tie dyeing, photography, ceramics, copper enameling and more.

Water sports are a big part of the program, including whitewater rafting, beginning and intermediate canoe and kayak lessons, water sliding and tubing. This highly social group will have plenty of opportunity for fun with talent night and other social events. There will be workshops in relationship development, leadership, human sexuality and religion. Campers choose a Junior council to represent them in choosing the programming content.



Build An Adventure Camp

for grades eight through twelve.
Sunday, July 2, through Saturday, July 15
Total cost is \$577.

Teamwork, responsibility, adventure, appreciation for nature and fun - these are the goals of the Build An Adventure Camp. Campers are divided into small groups led by competent, qualified counselors. They spend one week in the national forests learning the basics of backpacking, rock climbing and whitewater boating, and gaining an appreciation for the natural world and how to care for it. The other week is spent on a construction project for The Mountain that is especially designed to teach them useful skills, develop cooperativeness and instill a sense of pride in accomplishment of a major task. This camp provides a strenuous, uplifting, growth enhancing, intense two weeks.

Transformations: Endings/Beginnings

for grades ten, eleven and twelve.
Sunday, June 18, through Saturday, July 1
Total cost is \$577.

This camp experience gives the senior high camper the opportunity to expand physically, mentally, emotionally and socially. There are specific rules concerning personal behavior and the use of intoxicants or drugs is strictly forbidden. This year's camp includes an arts and crafts program that is designed especially for senior high students, special nature programs, theme dinners and evening programs, cookouts, a Halloween costume ball, a traditional Heritage Day, a Moravian Love Feast, "Big Chill" ice cream party and much more.

Advanced adventure activities are available to campers, including rock climbing, rappelling, 24-hour experience and low-impact camping, kayaking and canoeing, whitewater rafting and more.




Christmas Around the World Planned for Holiday Season

From The Treasurer

Since The Mountain is a major financial undertaking, we plan to share thoughts from the Treasurer on a regular basis.

Dear Mountain Supporter,

This year marks the tenth anniversary of The Mountain. This wonderful dream is also a financial reality. Let's look at some of the figures on The Mountain's ten year history. These figures include 1980-1988 actual results and the 1989 plans. In ten years The Mountain has:

Run operations at about a break even basis once the first year fix up costs were spent.

Met all loan payment deadlines.

Consistently decreased debt through 1986 when a facilities upgrade (duplexing cabins, upgrade of dining hall, waste water treatment fix) was begun.

Raised \$791,300 through development efforts from 1980-1988.

Invested more than \$500,000 in The Mountain in addition to the original purchase.


Created a camp and conference center with assets of more than \$1 million and value to the UU community well in excess of this.

Set up a financial tracking system that various bankers call "one of the best, most thorough systems they have seen."

This is not to say we are on a smooth, easy road. In 1988 we had a disappointing year financially. We regrouped and established some tough budget procedures for ourselves. Gary Blaine and the staff have worked hard to hold costs in line with conservative revenue projections. This appears to be working. For the first time in a while we are doing better than budget through February.

The Mountain is much more than the physical plant and financial sheets. But we want you to know that the fiscal and business parts of The Mountain are taken seriously by the staff and the board. Next issue we will discuss our debt policies and long term plans for debt retirement.




Another Bahamian Sailing Trip Planned for December...
