"The Mountain has made a difference in my life." This was said by many of our 4700 guests, who came for a day, a weekend, or a week. As you know, this is a great place for people to learn how to build and live in community with one another. How exciting for those of us who work here to be a part of this truly magical place!

We were able to complete many improvements in 1991: the lower floor of our 12-bedroom lodge, communication/data systems upgrades, cabin and trail maintenance and enhanced customer service routines. Because of these, we were able to serve more people better: 3 large weddings, 24 congregational retreats (including groups from many Southeast congregations, as well as Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, and New York), and several conferences, among them Womenspirit, the annual meeting of the Western N.C. (environmental action) Alliance, and the continental UU annual meetings of CUUPS and CU2C2 (camp/conference center directors). And always very important, our youth programs remained strong and our food was great.

We're anticipating another exciting year in 1992. In response to your requests, we've created a new department called "Adventure Education" to give a better array of outdoor activities; we're introducing a new one-week camp for younger, first-time campers, and we've added a week to our ever-popular "Build An Adventure" program for high-school age campers. We're also committed to developing an Earth Education/Environmental Stewardship center. We hope you will be a part of one or more of these exciting ventures. The first edition of our calendar is enclosed for easy reference.

We've also changed our pricing philosophy somewhat for 1992. Although there have been some increase in costs, reflected in selected price increases, we are also establishing new package rates for most weekend and weeklong programs, more extensive discount opportunities for our members, seasonal rates, and sensitivity to housing arrangements. We believe that most members will be able to enjoy The Mountain in 1992 for nearly the same cost - or often, at lower cost - than in 1991!

We hope that you'll find programs that will interest you in the enclosed schedule or in later brochures and the program guide supplements which you'll receive during this year. We know 1992 will be a year of wonderful opportunities for our members, but be sure to register as early as possible so that we can see you this year.

Also, please take time to review the **member policies** printed on the back of the calendar. This is the most complete statement that our Board has published in several years, and it will be useful to you **and** to your friends who may be interested in our facilities and programs.

Linens will be provided to all guests for the duration of their visit at a cost of \$5.00 per person (including all children occupying beds.) As a member benefit, any current member may choose to bring all towels and sheets to avoid linen costs.

Program fees: Standard onsite programs require a minimum charge of approximately \$5 per person per day. Special programs and services will require additional fees. Group package rates may be available; please call our office for details.

This program is designed especially for the initial away-from-home experience at lower cost. Experienced preschool owner Dr. Pam Phelps (our 1980-90 camp director), will work with the whole family on opening day to ease the transition to our camp program. At week's end, in the fullness of the completed camp experience, you are invited to join our closing circle.

At the close of Senior High Camp and the opening of the MountainCamp we will be providing special weekend activities for the whole family.

Mountaincamp I (Grades 2-3) & Mountaincamp II (Grades 4-6)

Age groupings are maintained in separate cabins and activities for our two-week camps which aim for optimal personal development/growth experiences for cooperative living, self-reliance, and stimulation by offering challenges at levels designed to assure individual success. Swimming, lake rafting, tubing, arts & crafts, waterfall picnics, nature and adventure hikes, etc., for the younger group are supplemented by an overnight low-impact camping experience (to highlight special Earth-awareness workshops), canoeing lessons on flat water, and other more challenging activities for the older group.

Junior High Camp (Grades 7-9) July 19-Aug.1 \$ 595 per camper

Great adventures await this energetic age group: whitewater rafting, beginning rock-climbing, team-building initiatives, and backpacking hikes to overnight camping are featured activities. With peer-group concerns so important, we work to better cooperation and group problem-solving skills.

Senior High Camp (Grades 10-12) June 21-July 4 \$ 595 per camper

This challenging and growth-inspiring high adventure experience provides a solid base for social, emotional, and physical maturity. Multiple levels of activities are offered for the novice as well as the more-experienced camper including all levels of canoeing and rock-climbing instruction, a night hike to an overnight campout, Earth-awareness workshops, and team-building initiatives with an optional ropes course, etc. Supervised evening activities are planned by Spirits, teens chosen from 1991 campers.

Build An Adventure (Grades 10-12) July 5-25 \$800 per camper

This year a small group of campers will experience the special bonds of the intensity of an environ-mentallyconscious service project at **The Mountain**. The typical canoeing, rafting, and other activities are crowned by
a ten-day backpacking adventure in our incomparable natural surroundings. Teamwork, development of
practical skills, and physical challenges bring increased maturity and self-confidence upon accomplishing these
meaningful major tasks. With joint direction of our new Adventure Education and Youth Programs, each
camper's success is assured.

ASCENDERS (Grades 10-12) 6 weeks July 5-Aug. 25 \$ 375 per ASCENDER

Eight ASCENDERS will be chosen from this year's Senior High Campers to continue for this program designed for the transition phase from adolescent to young adult. Your separate, early application is required so that our special youth counselors can properly select this "family" of apprentices who work separately (for six hours each day, six days per week), but live, learn, and play together for the duration of this program. Each evening will be set aside for group development, and one day each week will be reserved for fun together. In our 11 years, we have had many successful "graduates." Please call our Youth Program staff for your specific questions.
