Youth Programs Update

The following comments are excerpted from Karen Kleiber's report to the MR&LC Board in August.

the mountain is in the process of "growing and becoming," and I am excited to be a part of it as the Youth Programs Director. Youth programming at **the mountain** has always been successful due to its respect for and dedication to youth. This year we have renewed and energized our commitment to quality youth programming. This is exemplified by the fact that I have been hired as a full-time year-round staff person dedicated solely to creating and implementing youth programs. I am responsible for mountaintincamp, CONFERENCES, and any and all youth activities which are part of other programs, such as as congregational retreats and the Thanksgiving members' weekend. We are also hoping to establish educational and school programming in the near future.

Our commitment and ability to work with youth is clearly demonstrated by the very successful camps this past summer. Our camps were virtually 100% accident free, with only some minor health concerns which could not have been prevented by our staff. I believe that we have come a long way in assuring safety, and limiting **the mountain's** liability. Our goals now are focused on improving a system that already works.

While I am working on improving all aspects of youth programming, I know that what we give to youth goes far beyond our systems and procedures. Coming to **the mountain** offers children a truly safe space. Our incredibly caring staff ensured that two sisters, campers here in the middle of their parents' difficult divorce, found sanctuary and were re-energized when they returned home. Through camperships we make sure that those who might not otherwise come to camp are able to do so. This summer we enabled a young woman living in a children's home to attend both the ASCENDER and Senior High camp programs, and we know that she is forever strengthened by this experience.

In our work with youth, I believe that not only do we fulfill **the mountain's** mission statement by energizing youth to work for positive change, but we, the staff, actually work directly for positive change. I am here today because I see there is opportunity to do meaningful work as part of the **mountain's** vision. I, myself, have been forever changed by the gifts which **the mountain** has given me in my 13 summers here. I know that in many ways mistakes happen for youth at **the mountain** and that the confidence kids gain here can be truly life transforming.



REFUEL

(Residential Education For Unique Experiential Learning) is a program based on a concept that has evolved for many years here at the mountain. It is a five month residency for young adults who are unclear what the next step in their lives should be. The purpose of *REFUEL* is to create a safe and supportive environment for individuals to foster their interests and talents while broadening their skills and understanding. *REFUEL* participants will maintain a safe environment by committing to a drug and alcohol free lifestyle and by living in community with one another. This "safe space" that we often talk about at the mountain is essential for the young adults in the program to recognize and work toward their own potential.

REFUEL will be shaped around individual participants' interests. There are several basic components of the program, including apprenticeships, community service, informal academics, high adventure, leadership training and guidance services. We are still accepting applications for a January start date. Please call Sarah Walls on Ext. 241 for more information.

Sarah Walls started full time work at the mountain in May, 1997.
