REFUEL is launched!

Four young adults are participating in the first REFUEL program, which runs through mid May. Cory Andser is a UU from San Diego, CA. He has joined us after completing a two year degree at Landmark College and is here to decide what vocational or educational direction he wants to take in the next few years. Naomi Thomas, a '97 high school graduate from Griffin, GA is researching religious studies majors at a variety of schools and is intentional about spiritual exploration. She is passionate about the arts, particularly writing and theater. Keturah Orr is from Brevard, NC. She is a committed social activist and is seeking ways to integrate activism into her education and career. Jesse Poole-Van Swol, a UU from Safety Harbor, FL, wants to become a minister and is seeking ways to facilitate growth in that direction.

These REFUEL students are an exciting group of people. Incredibly sensitive and intelligent, each of them has brought unique insights and experiences to the Mountain community. With ambitious dreams, they seek to recognize their potential and gain focus.

Along with apprenticeships around the Mountaintop, REFUEL students perform community service, engage in intentional goal setting and informal academics and explore social issues through the program component, *Journey to Action*. This program is a framework within which we explore

different social issues each month. Our focus on issues of race and diversity in January took us to Atlanta for Martin Luther King Day and fostered exciting discussions around affirmative action, institutional and interpersonal racism and our own ethnic backgrounds. Each month, we will be exploring issues that challenge our world view and our personal understanding of the relationships we share. In line with the mission of the Mountain to embrace the diversity of life, energizing people to work for positive change, it is our vision that the *Journey to Action* series will continue to gain breadth and depth as REFUEL evolves. REFUEL students are not only learning about themselves in this program, but are finding their way within the context of community. Their engaged participation, unique skills and talents are great contributions to our Mountain.

REFUEL has a great future at the Mountain. Its components and curricula are evolving through the collaboration of the students, consultants and Mountain staff. We are currently accepting applications for the next session, beginning in the fall of 1998. 

CABIN UPGRADES UNDERWAY!

Financial Support Still Needed...

The December issue of *The Mountain Matters* highlighted the renovation of the bunkhouse cabins (# 13 - 19), but what's actually being done to transform them from rustic summer cabins to safe and sturdy, year-round guest space is nothing short of amazing! Work has progressed steadily since our last issue (with the project scheduled for completion by the first of April). We're excited to be able to offer our youth programs guests—from youth camp to school groups—safe and comfortable housing, more conducive to community building than ever before!

During the month of January, a professional construction crew (with help from some able volunteers) has stabilized the foundations of all the cabins, created level floors and brought the walls into plumb. Each cabin has received sturdier siding, well-installed electrical wiring, weather proof windows and door and a re-built, child-safe porch. Already the cabins are looking cozy enough to spend a winter night in! Ultimately, the picture will be completed by metal enamel roofing that will last at least twenty five years (as opposed to the two to three years of service given by our current roofing




material), ramps that extend all the way to the ring road, propane heating systems and new inside furnishings that will make the space even more practical and comfortable for campers and guests. The renovation of Cabin 19 has been generously funded by Carole Light, Alex Redmountain and Mo Wheeler. Cabins 13-18 (at \$12,000 each) are still in need of funding, but the safety and comfort of our children and youth make this project an immediate necessity.

Also in progress are the upgrades to cabins 7-12 – with additions to the decking, new windows, new doors and improved amenities inside the cabins to make your stay more pleasant. Five of these cabins have already been "adopted" with \$5,000 gifts – Cabin 8 - Anonymous, Cabin 9 - In honor of Ian Denham by his many friends on his 50th birthday in December, Cabin 10 - Zed & George Kesner, Cabin 11 - In Memory of Robert Schilling and Cabin 12 - Margaret Schilling.

Though youth camp at The Mountain is far less costly than most summer camps, for many families, a camp experience for one or more children is still not financially possible. Each year, The Mountain awards "Camperships" to families who would otherwise be unable to send a child to MOUNTAINCAMP. Last summer 23 campers received Camperships, generally awarded in amounts up to fifty percent of the program's total cost. We awarded \$7,000 total: \$1,000 more than we had in our Campership Fund! It's important to us that our programs be as financially accessible as possible. Offering assistance is a part of making our commitment to socioeconomic justice a reality. It was an exhilarating and challenging schedule - 2400 miles and 31 events in 12 days, including eight concerts, two Sunday worship services, wonderful potlucks, receptions, luncheons and visits to individuals in their homes. If we had a dollar for every piece of equipment loaded and unloaded into Tom and Jane's RV (our terrific "Mountain-mobile") we could fund a year's worth of scholarships.

We came home with a clear message: Florida UUs need and want The Mountain in their lives! We were truly enriched by the wonderful people we met along the way who opened themselves to our music and our message. And we were inspired by the privilege of "telling the Good News" of The Mountain: this institution's stories are about transformational experiences, passion and commitment to making a difference in the world! The Mission of The Mountain is to energize people to work for positive change. Wherever we go, we hear resounding support for this mission as we all work toward and contribute to a just and ethical society.

Some of the immediate results of the trip.....a Life Membership and several pledges of gifts in the near future; a new REFUEL participant (whose mom heard about the program on the 16th and arrived six days later with her

enthusiastic son who'd dropped everything to get into the program at the last minute); and a \$5000 matching gift from Bob and Anne Hornberger in order for the Quartet to cut a compact disc and share our music with a broader audience! We know that long-term relationships will continue to develop, too as we continue to serve and nurture our Florida members and friends.

This major outreach effort would not have been possible without the caring, competent staff who stayed behind, kept The Mountain running smoothly in our absence and so warmly welcomed 55 members of Atlanta's Peachtree Methodist Choir for their January retreat. We also thank Larry Wheeler, who handled all the arrangements and was the inspiration behind the tour!

Volunteers!!



Getting Ready for Camp!

While it is only January 28, and the summer is more than 4 months away MOUNTAINCAMP registrations and preparations are already in full swing. As of today, both Junior High, Senior High and Work & Adventure camps are close to capacity enrollment. We have even begun waitlists in some camps. We encourage people to join the waitlist—spaces do open! Elementary camp, Senior High Leadership School, and Beginning camp are slower to fill but are making continual progress. The good news is that Gillian Denham will design and run the one-week Beginning MOUNTAINCAMP again this year—ensuring us another successful summer.

With the office taking registrations, and Gillian designing Beginning camp—what do I do? I organize. The camp schedules are finished, meaning that I can already tell you that on July 9th our Elementary youth will participate in Arts & Crafts, a hike up Scaly Mountain, rock climbing on our indoor wall, a trip to Cliffside Lake or Pot Hole rock slide, or a nature education program and games! While we need to be flexible with programming, it is a huge relief to know that the schedules and logistics are already taken care of, leaving more time for me and the Youth Camp Coordinators to focus on providing meaningful Mountain experiences for our campers during the coming summer.

The selection process for staff, ASCENDERs and CITs will begin in late February. We have received a number of applications so far, but it's still not too late to call and request an application for any of the positions or programs. The CIT and ASCENDER programs are already taking shape and the mentors will soon be selected and can begin their own planning for the summer.

All of my camp preparations are informed by my personal experience, but also by the feedback I have received from youth, parents and staff. Thanks to all of you who have contributed to Youth Camp over the years, and continue to support and impact our programs! Summer Leadership Programs

Over the years, The Mountain has taken pride in offering annual leadership programs for UUs and non-UUs alike. Leadership training is part of our mission: creating an environment to energize people to work for positive change means developing programs that offer participants the tools to effect that change at home. Each year participants tell us that leadership programs have not only given them skills—the experiences have changed their lives. This summer, we are offering three programs for people either currently holding or preparing for future leadership roles who would like to enrich their contributions to their congregations and communities.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION WEEK (July 10-16) is a program designed for DREs, RE teachers and others involved in children's religious education. Jacqui James, Education and Resource Director in the Faith in Action department at the UUA, will lead the new Multicultural Renaissance Module for both new and experienced RE workers. Program and registration information is being mailed to all Southeast area DREs, past participants and Mountain Ambassadors.

The 18th annual **MOUNTAIN LEADERSHIP SCHOOL** (July 26-August 1). Leadership School dean (and Patron Member) Paul Clipp and faculty are preparing for another week of informative, experiential learning—excellent preparation for current and incoming UU lay leaders. Practice problem-solving difficult congregational issues, learn effective facilitation techniques and explore your personal theology. Members should encourage their board, minister and congregation to support attendance by identifying candidates now. Registration materials are now being mailed to all Mid South and T1 congregations, all district Executives and students from the past three years, but the program is open to all.

THE SENIOR HIGH LEADERSHIP SCHOOL FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE (August 2-8) is a week-long camp for activists and aspiring activists in the 10th grade through 1998 graduates. With workshops, visits to a variety of social justice organizations and group building activities, explore current social justice issues like race and diversity, gender, the environment and the role of government in social concerns. Participants gain an understanding of the issues, but just as importantly, learn how to take action! See the 1998 MOUNTAINCAMP brochure for details and registration information.
